As members will recall, reports in recent Journal editions have focused on the Cape Range Karst mining issue in Western Australia. Rauleigh Webb now advises (11 May) that he has received a letter from the W. A. Minister for the Environment, Hon. Judy Edwards, indicating that she did not accept the Australian Speleological Federation's (ASF's) argument that the level of assessment should be raised from a PER to PUEA (Proposal Unlikely to be Environmentally Acceptable), BUT she did accept our argument regarding raising the level of assessment to ERMP (Environmental Review and Management Program). This will at least ensure that a higher level of assessment is made prior to decision being made regarding the environmental impacts of the proposed mine at Cape Range. The public comment period will also be longer at ten weeks of public review period.

Rauleigh would particularly like to thank those people/groups who wrote letters appealing at the Level of Assessment regarding the proposed mine at Cape Range, and to again thank the Environmental Defenders Office in Perth that was of great assistance in the ASF's objection to the Level of Assessment.

I was talking to Buchan Caves Senior Ranger, Dale Calnin, the other day. He and Stephanie Finn (Buchan Ranger-in-Charge) had a great time at the Conference, and they are now gearing up for some major capital works. John Cunningham, a departmental Capital Works Project Officer, is into full swing with the coming re-lighting of Royal Cave at Buchan. He has recently been to Jenolan and Wombeyan, and has consulted extensively, in particular, with Mick Chalker. A full infrastructure and lighting plan will be developed in coming months, with the project scheduled to commence straight after Easter 2002. Wonderful (and long awaited) stuff!

A big welcome to the Committee to our new ACKMA Officer Bearers who were elected at the recent AGM at Wee Jasper. As you'll note, Mia Thurgate as changed roles, Dr. Grant Gartrell has become "real" Treasurer, and our new committee people are Peter Dimond as President, Cameron James as Executive Officer, and Jackie Taylor as Information Officer (Australia) & Assistant Executive Officer.
