Although Jack had been threatening for some years that he would be gone before Christmas, he never did tell us which Christmas he meant. Jack's contribution to the operation at Buchan has been outstanding. His never-ending passion for work and commitment to the resource has been faultless.

During his years of service at Buchan, he was known as "Jack of all Trades" and played a major role in keeping the caves and the reserve operating with the limited funds available. He was the Reserve's electrician, plumber, mechanic, concrete, bricklayer, tree faller, and carpenter. All of which he had no accreditation or ticket for, but

he did the job and carried it out to the finest degree.
