
WAITOMO REMEMBERS THE PASSING OF AN ICON

Peter Dimond was warmly, and somewhat sadly, remembered at a memorial dedication ceremony held at the Waitomo Museum of Caves on 20 December 2003, one year since his tragic and untimely death.

As you know, Peter was a long time member and former President of ACKMA, associated with caves and caving for almost 50 years (!); and, the founder and driving force behind the Waitomo Museum of Caves.

The Multi-media Theatre and show *Arachnocampa luminosa* (the New Zealand Glowworm) were dedicated to Peter and his achievements during the ceremony that was attended by over 100 friends.

Also attending were Sue Dimond, Peter's sister and his son, Christian, who unveiled a memorial plaque. A photographic album depicting Peter's rich and full life was also placed on display in the Museum.
