

Some more unfortunate news... Well known ACKMA member, and Manager of Te Anau Caves in New Zealand, Neil Collinson, was involved in a bad car accident on 27 January. It was head on smash with a campervan that crossed the centerline when he was heading down to the south coast. He was in hospital for some time but is now home, though still with both legs out of action. Evidentially, it was a very close call, and he was very lucky not to be killed. He has had a left leg and knee reconstruction, after operations to his right leg which included plating of a compound break of his femur and also a smashed heel.

Fortunately, his head and spine are OK (thanks to airbags). Neil expects it will be at least more than several months before he can return to work. His youngest daughter Greer and her friend were also in the smash, but fortunately they received only minor injuries. I am sure all members will join me in wishing Neil a full and speedy recovery.

Now, the great news – Buchan! ACKMA Fellow Dale Calnin reports 'It's all happening!' He has a tidy \$600,000 *in his pocket*, with the promise of much more to follow. Royal Cave is currently closed for effectively a full re-light. All 24Ov fittings in both Royal and Fairy Caves are to be removed, and the caves re-lit substantially in LEDs, although some 32v fittings will stay. Royal will be closed for eight weeks, and then Fairy will be done – with both back 'on-line' by September. All emergency/track lighting in both caves will be replaced with LEDs. The Royal re-lighting will substantially follow Neil Kell's lighting plan. In addition, a large amount of hand railing will be replaced with stainless steel.

But wait, there's more! – Replacement of Fairy Creek Bridge (\$80K); Upgrade of Swimming Pool amenities (\$80K); Heritage Rock Wall Restoration – two retaining walls (\$50K); Construction of the main Picnic BBQ Pavilion (\$20K); Stability Assessment and Restoration of Entrance Archway (\$12K); and Upgrade of Royal Cave car park and exit track (\$15K). Stunning stuff! Dale reckons he was too busy to come to our Rocky AGM – a very poor excuse. Anyway, there will undoubtedly be a paper at our Margaret River Conference next year!

THE 19TH INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM OF SUBTERRANEAN BIOLOGY will convene in Fremantle, Western Australia from 21-26 September 2008 under the auspices of the International Society for Subterranean Biology. These symposia are the principle global forum connecting researchers working on both the terrestrial and aquatic components of subterranean biology.

Australia's subterranean fauna is amongst the more diverse globally, a far cry from little more than a decade ago when it was considered impoverished. Recent studies have revealed classes, orders and families of animals new to Australia and the Southern Hemisphere. Diversity is particularly high in the rangelands and the arid zone, a distribution that coincides with major resource projects for which subterranean fauna has become significant a environmental issue. This research was initiated by the Western Australian Museum, the host institution for the conference, and developed in collaboration with a national and global network of scientists.


