Our President, Steve Bourne, also spoke briefly and presented Mick with the ACKMA Outstanding Achievement in Cave and Karst Management and Conservation Award (a framed certificate).

A highlight was the presence and speech of inaugural ACKMA Life Member, Clive Stiff – Mick's long-term predecessor as Manager of Wombeyan Caves. Clive, now wheelchair bound, is over eighty, but still very lucid. His speech was a joy, and most humorous! Of course, at the end, Mick responded, modestly, as usual.

Mick and Annette received many gifts, mostly red wine (his long-term favourite tipple, of course). I did

manage to induce all attending present and past Wombeyan staff into a group photo – a valuable record indeed.

Personally, it was great to catch up with many cave luminaries, some of whom I had not seen for quite some time. Of the many tributes, perhaps the one that fully encapsulates Mick's achievements was a letter read out from Alan Griffin (who unfortunately would not be present in person). It read as follows:

I send my very best wishes to Annette and Mick tonight, along with sincere apologies for my absence. This celebration of two fine careers is one I swore I would not miss, and yet, frustratingly, the weekend has coincided with my parents 60th wedding anniversary celebrations.

I'd just like to say, and I'm sure I'm adding to the general opinion, that it was a pleasure to work with Annette and Mick who had a special knack for making colleagues, guests and visitors to Wombeyan feed incredibly welcome. They made a unique team, and their enthusiasm, professionalism, warmth and hospitality created a unique environment, which we've all, at one time or another, been very fortunate to enjoy.

I know Mick will be the first to commend Annette on her invaluable contribution – her support and capacity to turn her hand to whatever needed to be done, keep the place ticking over and keep Mick in line have to be applauded. I know Annette often put in long hours and tremendous effort to ensure the customers were happy and the day-to-day business attended to – she's been a rock and a great employee. The blend of sensitive conservation of a remarkable geographic spectacle combined with user-friendly cave tours stand as a tribute to the sustained effort Mick has put in over 30 years of dedicated service.

Finally, over the years, Mick engaged, managed and fostered relationships with a diverse range of stakeholders involved at Wombeyan. He demonstrated a real ability to garner community interest and support for projects that will ensure the Reserve will be enjoyed by successive generations. Of particular note is his relationship with the traditional landowners of Pijar, Gandungarra and Wiradjuri and their

representatives. His record of ensuring the indigenous people are involved in initiatives at Wombeyan was achieved in a sensitive and characteristically unobtrusive manner.

Mick's shown determination, dedication and commitment over much of his life to preserve and protect the Wombeyan Reserve so visitors can continue to enjoy and marvel at this natural wonder. It's a commendable career and he's a remarkable man.

Annette and Mick are a great team – may they pull together long into the future. I wish them every happiness.
