

Engelbrecht Cave, Mt Gambier, South Australia



The world-famous Engelbrecht Cave is located in (and underneath) the city of Mount Gambier, South Australia. In 2019, this cave became the second largest in the Limestone Coast region, following a diving expedition discovery by Josh Richards and Matthew Aisbett, which uncovered an addition of 370 m to the cave. This is no surprise as Mount Gambier's landscape is predominantly one of the volcanoes, sinkholes, caves and crater lakes, making it a destination worth visiting.

In this regionally complex and diverse landscape, the Limestone Coast is known for significant caves with differing geological and paleontological features. Engelbrecht Cave is an incredible limestone cave with marine fossils pointing to it being approximately 15 million years old. From the top of the cave, it just looks like a noticeable-sized sink hole, however, heading downwards the doline splits into an east and a west cavern, which both tourists and cave divers are able to explore. The City of Mount Gambier has just hit their first-year milestone in operating and offering guided tour experiences at Engelbrecht Cave. Engelbrecht Cave is accessible in two ways.

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The cave is open daily with five tour guided experiences running on the 'quarter past the hour'. The tour guide takes a small group down to a maximum of 30 metres underground to discover the full sensory experience this show cave offers. The tour journeys through the history, the geology and the underground magic of Engelbrecht Cave, with views of crystal-clear waters that accredited divers enter to further explore the water-filled passages underneath the city.

Bookings are essential for this 30-minute guided experience of Mount Gambier's best show cave. Visit our website here for more information or to make a booking.

For accredited divers, Engelbrecht Cave has two main submerged cave passages with one running in an easterly direction and one running in a westerly direction. For those daring enough, and who hold a relevant cave diving licence, the West chamber extends over 300m and the East Cave extends over 400 m.
